Museum of the Cape Fear

The Museum of the Cape Fear is a branch of the North Carolina Museum of History Division. The museum traces the events that shaped the development of North Carolina. Highlights include pottery and exhibits about the early settlements of American Indians, the antebellum period, the Civil War, and the textile industry. A 1920s general store can also be seen. Tours of the 1897 Edgar Allan Poe House interpret late Victorian life, 1897-1917.

Overhills

In the 19th century, the Overhills property was the core of a 13,000-acre turpentine plantation owned by Daniel McDiarmid. From 1901 until 1913 the property was held as a hunt preserve by various northern business partners. It was developed as a resort with the founding of the Overhills Country Club in 1913. Construction of a nine-hole golf course was initiated in 1913 under the direction of the world-renowned golf course architect, Donald J. Ross. In 1919, W. Averell Harriman and Percy Avery Rockefeller, frequent Overhills Country Club guests, took over the bulk of the investment and began the construction of private vacation residences on the grounds. From the 1920s to the 1960s, Overhills underwent extensive development as a Rockefeller family winter retreat. The U. S. Army purchased the 10,546-acre Overhills tract from the Rockefeller family in 1997 for use as training land and development buffer zone. Cultural resource inventories identified 21 archaeological sites, and 113 buildings, structures, and landscapes within a 5,700-acre district eligible for the National Register.

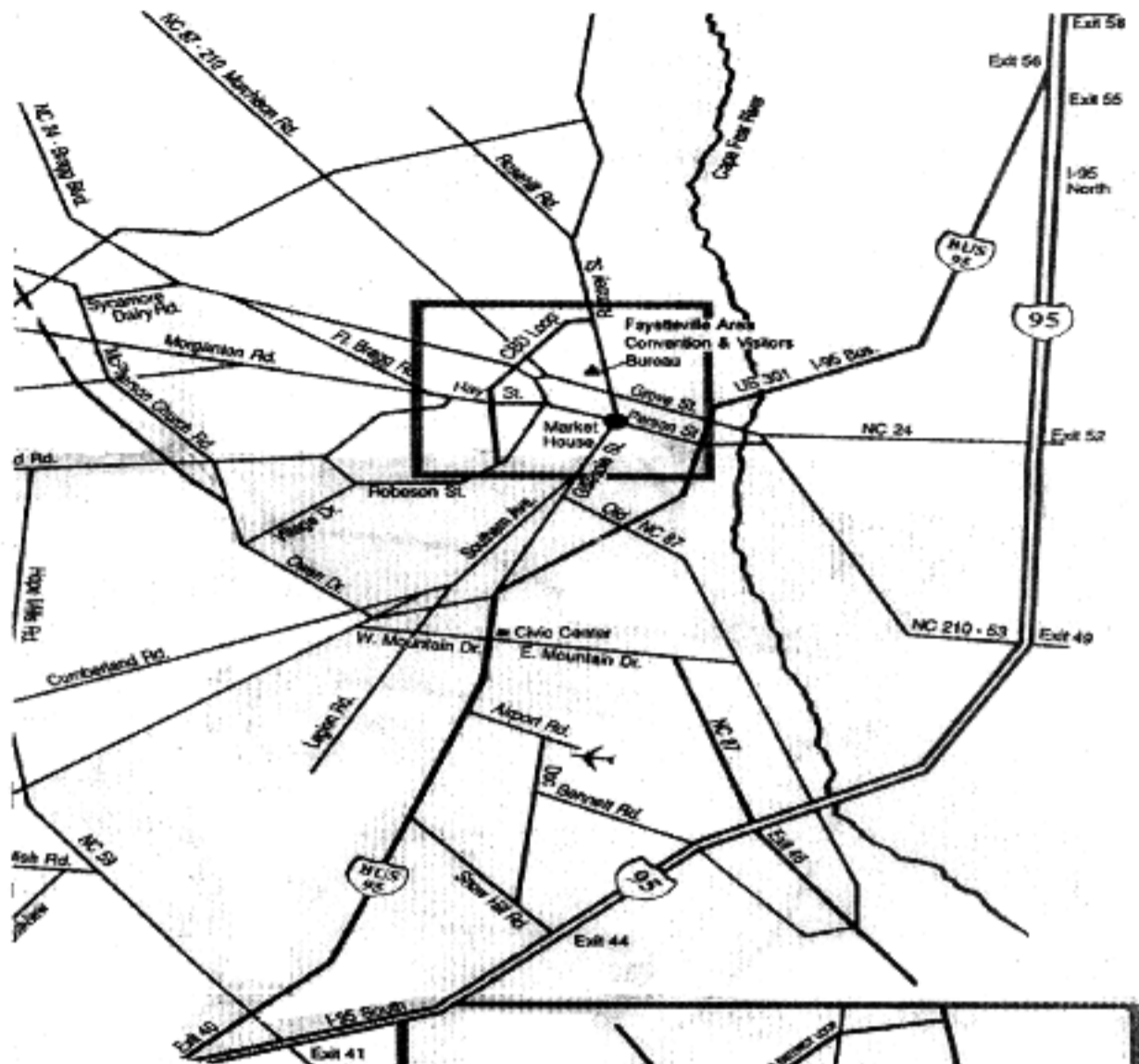
**To get to the Museum of the Cape Fear,
801 Arsenal Avenue, Fayetteville:**

From I-95 North:
Take Exit 56 - US 301/Bus 95
Follow Bus 95 south to Person St.
Turn right onto Person Street
(becomes Hay Street after circle).
Take Hay Street to Bradford, turn left.
Take Bradford to Arsenal, turn right.

From I-95 South:
Take Exit 40 - Bus 95
Follow Bus 95 north to Person Street.
Follow directions as listed above.

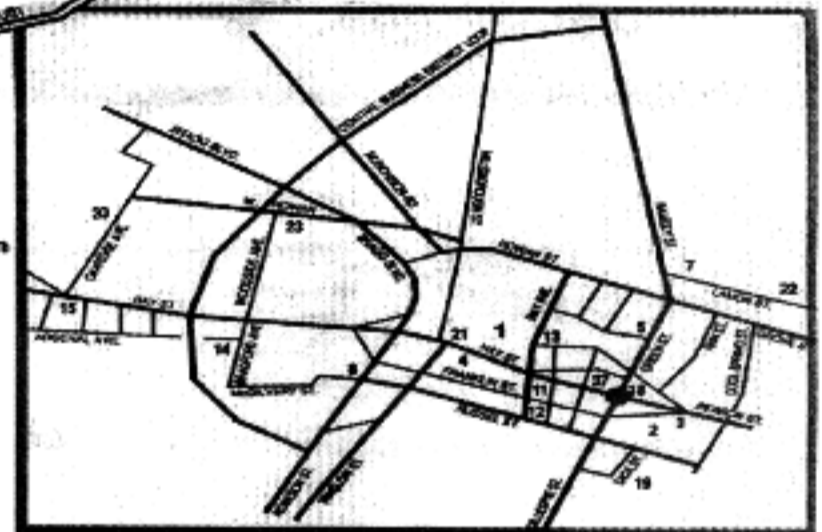
From Ft. Bragg:

Follow directions as listed above.



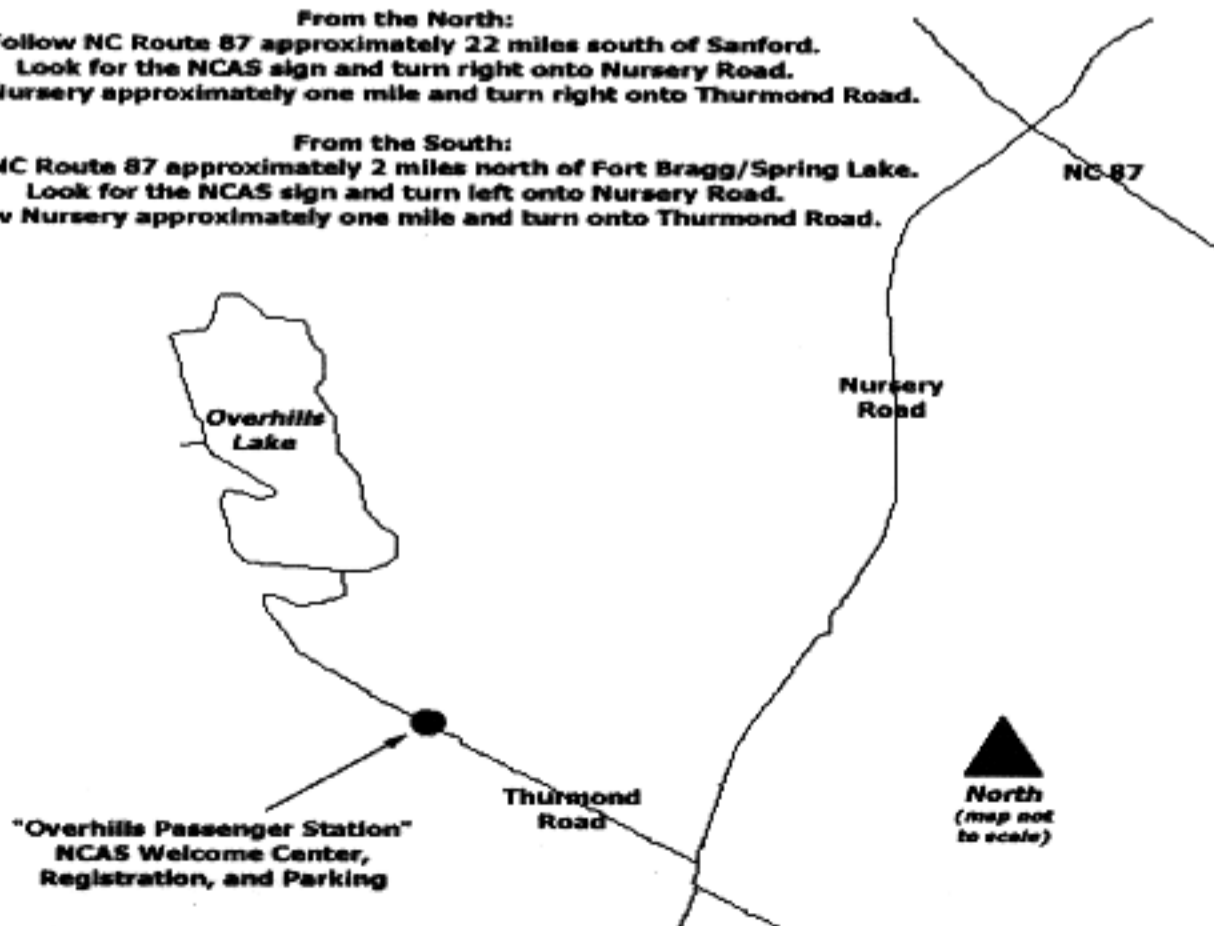
