#### **Directions to UNC's North Campus**

Hyde Hall, Alumni Building, and the Morehead Planetarium are located on UNC's North Campus, just off East Franklin Street (see <a href="https://www.unc.edu/maps">www.unc.edu/maps</a> for a searchable campus map). Public parking is available in the Morehead Planetarium Lot, along East Franklin Street, and in the Downtown Chapel Hill Parking Deck (accessed from Rosemary Street one block north of East Franklin Street).


From Raleigh and eastern North Carolina: Take I-40 West to Exit 270 (HWY 15-501). Take a left off of the exit to get onto 15-501 going towards Chapel Hill. After 1.5 miles, the road forks. Stay to the right and get on Franklin Street when it splits off. The Morehead Planetarium Lot will be on your left in about 2.5 miles.

From Burlington, Greensboro, and western North Carolina: Take I-40 East (watch for the separation of I-85 and I-40 just east of Efland) to exit 266 – Highway 86. Turn right. Highway 86 becomes Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd (Historic Airport Rd.). Stay on Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. 4.1 miles to the Franklin Street traffic light. Turn left. The Morehead Planetarium Lot is on the right about a half-mile after turning on Franklin Street.

From Durham and areas northeast of Durham: Take I-85 South to 15-501 South. Continue 1.6 miles past the I-40 interchange and take the Franklin Street exit, which veers off to the right. The Morehead Planetarium Lot will be on your left in about 2.5 miles.

## Archaeology at Colonial Brunswick by Stanley South



In Archaeology at Colonial Brunswick, Stan South recounts the decade-long excavation of this important North Carolina colonial port. He provides historical context and detailed interpretation of the many hundreds of objects uncovered. South's narrative guides the reader through a town and a way of life that ended more than two centuries ago. The experience is enhanced by 196 illustrations that include photographs of excavated buildings and artifacts, archaeological site plans, and interpretive drawings. Archaeology at Colonial Brunswick meets the inquisitive needs of the general public while answering the scientific queries of archaeologists.

Stan South is a research professor and archaeologist at the South Carolina Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology, which is part of the University of South Carolina. Considered by many to be a pioneer of historical archaeology, South has written a number of books on this topic, including the canonical *Method and Theory in Historical Archaeology* (1977). He began his career in 1956 at the N.C. Department of Archives and History and conducted the initial archaeological investigations at Town Creek Indian Mound as well as at Brunswick.

## NCAS Grants-in-Aid Program for 2010-2011

This fall, the North Carolina Archaeological Society will continue its Grants-in-Aid Program designed to fund research pertaining to North Carolina Archaeology. At least one grant up to \$1000 will be awarded each year. Applicants must be members of the North Carolina Archaeological Society and must also meet one or more of the following criteria: applicants must meet one or more of the following criteria: (a) a graduate or undergraduate student actively pursuing a degree in archaeology or a related field; (b) an individual enrolled in an internship program with a museum, a state historic site, an archaeological park, or a Native American group (with state or federal recognition): or (c) an avocational archaeologist who has over time demonstrated a concern for the protection or study of archaeological resources within the state. The next deadline for proposals is November 1, 2010. Grant recipients will be selected by the NCAS Endowment Committee, whose members currently include Randy Daniel (co-chair), Rick Langley, David Moore (co-chair), Ken Robinson, Vin Steponaitis, and Ann Tippitt.

The grants are underwritten by the NCAS Endowment Fund which was established in 2001 from the proceeds of the sale of the "Blue Banks" property near Greenville. The sale took place largely through the efforts of then-president Robert Graham. We owe him our thanks for making these grants possible!
