



Town Creek Indian Mound State Historic Site brings to life the dynamic culture left behind by prehistoric Indians over 500 years ago. On a bluff overlooking the junction of Town Creek and the Little River, these Indians of the Pee Dee culture established a religious, ceremonial and burial center that was the focal point of their society. This once obscure culture has been revealed through the meticulous excavation of archaeological features and artifacts.

Your visit to Town Creek Indian Mound will, through interpretive exhibits and an audiovisual program, introduce you to these early inhabitants of our state. Guided tours of the rebuilt Indian structures and mound will allow you to see first-hand the major temple, priests' dwelling, and ceremonial grounds.

New Book

The Archeological Society of Virginia announces publication of a new book, Contributions to the Archeology of Southwest Virginia. The book contains reports on extensive excavations done at two major prehistoric sites--one in Bland County and one in Tazewell County. The volume honors the late Emory Eugene Jones, Jr. of Bluefield, WV, who did the work over a 25-year period, but who died in 1996. Jones' dedication to archeology and its contributions to knowledge made him an outstanding avocational archeologist.

Each site was that of a palisaded village occupied around AD 1500. The Indians lived in circular houses, stored foods and other goods in underground storage pits, buried their dead in individual graves inside the village, and traded with Indians who lived nearer the Atlantic Ocean. The Indians' identity is unknown, but the work done revealed much about their lifestyles and culture. Comparing the excavated data with those from other sites shows a close relationship among villagers in an area reaching from Kingsport, Tennessee northeastward to about Covington, Virginia, generally north-northwest of Interstate 81. Since no historical records mention the local Indians, only further archeological research can determine their tribal and linguistic relationships.

The 200-page book is available at two local museums—Crab Orchard Museum at Pisgah in Tazewell County and Wolf Creek Indian Village and Museum near Bastian in Bland County. Both Museums display artifacts typical of the late Indian culture described. In addition, the book can be ordered by mail from the Archeological Society of Virginia, PO Box 70395, Richmond, VA 23255 for \$18.00, plus \$3.00 mailing cost.
